Bell Ringing

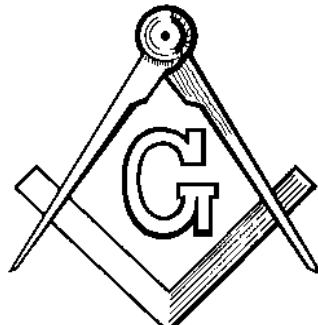
All of the lodges in the District have signed up and staffed their sites. We are looking toward a tremendous year.
